## **PARABLES: WEEK ONE...**

**Statement...**in his opening remarks, Mike told us WHAT THE PARABLES ARE and WHY JESUS TOLD THEM. Reflect on it:

## What are parables and why did Jesus use them? Why did Jesus use metaphor as a teaching method?

His parables were **unscripted** and **spontaneous**. Some were **prompted** by **questions from a crowd/Disciples**, a critical **comment** by a **critic**, or Jesus' **personal reaction** on something that **he noticed**. In this study, try to **imagine the different reactions Jesus got** as he told **his parables**.

TWICE-TOLD STORIES....Mike compared them to "twice-told stories" a story first told orally in one setting, then repeated in another setting. In an oral culture, this was how people communicated and Jesus knew that his audience would pass on his stories.

## Think of how different our culture communicates. How might Jesus adapt his style if he were teaching today?

Gospels record **post-parable explanations**, but they are **written in the 3**<sup>rd</sup> **person**. Most scholars to believe that **these private tutorials** may be the **Gospel writers talking** to their audiences rather than **Jesus making "on-the-spot interpretations**".

**CATEGORIES OF PARABLES**...using a handout, Mike walked through the different types of parables Jesus told. Knowing a parable's type is crucial to interpreting it properly. During this study, try to observe the common themes in each parable category.

KINGDOM PARABLES...Mike examined **3 Kingdom parables**, showing how they focus in **one way or another on God's Kingdom**, a present but not totally fulfilled Kingdom. Write down what you recall about each...
