Do What We Can, While We Can

March 2022

Following Jesus is an HONOR but it's also a responsibility. It involves a CALL TO ACT, to let our lives begin where our prayers end. The harvest is plentiful, Jesus said, but there is a rampant shortage of LABORERS. If trends continue, where will Christianity be in 50 years? Our task isn't just KEEPING THE FAITH; it is also SPREADING THE FAITH. Christianity began as a MOVEMENT and it still thrives in its ORGINAL FORM as a mission, not as an INSTITUTION. Without a sense of mission, our lives are intolerable. My biggest worries about the future revolve around this issue:

Has Christianity reached the point where all we have to offer is moral opinions or a list of DO'S/DONT'S? Christians are now known not for who we are, but what we are against.

We have turned faith into a NEGATIVE. Some Christians have a false view of what being a holy person means. It gets defined by doing nothing wrong: if you do this or don't do that, you will be okay. What is a holy person? Is it the words we use or do not use? What we do or fail to do? Where we go or don't go? Is it quoting the bible, attending the right church, or saying the right prayers? Does being a Christ follower all come down to what we are not supposed to do? No! That kind of faith isn't large enough to capture our hearts or to demand our lives. God didn't create us NOT TO DO SOMEHTING. The first Christians put Christianity on the map, not by protesting what they were against, but by standing up for what they believed and telling others whom they served. If we talked less/did more, we would have a greater impact.

Jesus wants to awaken us from complacency: to inspire us to be daring enough to be different, humble enough to make mistakes, and real enough to help others see how imperfect we are. We must act now: to do what we can, while we can, for as long as we can. Have you put God on hold and do not know where to begin? God doesn't like to be put on hold. There are things that God seeks to do through us and maybe only through us. There are lives not being blessed, gifts not being shared, and relationships not being restored because we are not doing our part. He made us ON PURPOSE/FOR A PURPOSE: to glorify him, to make him smile, and to be a blessing. The word of God to us is:

YOU CAN DO NOTHING WRONG AND STILL DO NOTHING RIGHT. BEING HOLY MEANS MORE THAN AVOIDING SIN AND DOING NO WRONG. IT'S ABOUT DOING SOMETHING RIGHT, PUTTING THE DREAMS GOD GIVES YOU INTO PRACTICE.

God promises us **ETERNITY**, but he **never promised anyone tomorrow**. We have **forever to enjoy the blessings** of what we do with our lives, but only so many hours before sundown to **make those memories**.

The New Horizons Sunday school class has been studying climate change using the book *Climate Church*, *Climate World: How People of Faith Must Work for Change by Jim Antal.*

The book explores many important themes:

- Our role as stewards of God's creation
- How global warming intensifies all forms of injustice
- The need to transition from personal to communal salvation
- The Golden Rule 2.0: Future generations are also our neighbor

Many of us are anxious about the impact of climate change. As individuals, and as a church community, we don't like change, inconvenience or feeling bad about our Western lifestyles. And as the realities of climate change become clear, the problem can feel so overwhelming that it's hard to know what to do first, or if the small things we do will make a difference. Therefore, one of the goals of this study is to produce concrete ideas for action, both as individuals and as a church. We are exploring several options, including PCUSA's certification for Earth Care Congregations and a recycling center to help with hard-to-recycle items. The youth will explore this theme on Youth Sunday this year, and our class is working on a resource list to share. To start with, all of us can reflect on what it means to be stewards of God's creation during Lent with a 2022 Lenten Carbon Calendar which will be available for pick up at the church.

Fall Prevention and Better Balance

Our Session has given us approval to resume our Balance classes! Many of our members enjoyed this class prior to COVID and there have been numerous requests to resume the class. On Thursday, March 10th, Scott Held, an Exercise Physiologist from the GBC Wellness Center will be here to talk with us about fall prevention and how to maintain better balance. Whether you are interested in leaning more about the fall prevention and how our balance impacts our quality of life, or you have been a part of the Balance class in the past, I feel that you will find the information beneficial and hope you will join us! This is a free seminar and will include a light lunch. (Reservation requested by March 6, 2022!)

As you know, a fall could be a life changing experience. Scott plans to teach us some techniques that can help diminish the possibility of a fall occurring. Scott will share with us the most common ways people fall and how it may be prevented. He will also perform several exercises to strengthen our foundation or "core muscles" If you have fallen, stumbled or can tell your balance has diminished, this class will be beneficial to you and your family. 


