

## Living a Guided Life

A Sunday school teacher wanted to illustrate what a miracle meant. She asked the class to imagine her standing on the roof of a tall building, losing her balance, and falling toward the ground. A sudden whirlwind swept up her and brought her safely to the ground. What word would describe that? A child said, "LUCK." That was not the word that the teacher wanted. She reset the scene-the falling, a sudden wind rescuing her. What word describes it? Another child said, "ACCIDENT." No, it wasn't an accident. She asked them to listen again, retold the story, and asked what word could account for it. A third child said, PRACTICE. The class didn't get her point. That last answer-practice-was wiser than the child knew.

The miracle isn't expecting a sudden wind to rescue us, but learning how, in a confusing, fear-filled world like ours, to **seek God's guidance** and be **led by His presence**. Spiritual growth has little to do with luck, and it is surely not an accident. It is the result of practice, daily living out our faith. God hasn't removed his presence; we've removed ours. We think we know **WHAT WE NEED** and so we ask God for **TOO LITTLE**: we pray asking for a **YES/NO ANSWER** to a puzzling problem, or some **CLEAR SIGN** to get us out of a dilemma we face. The God we seek to know and love must **BE SERVED**, not **USED**.

I want to live a GUIDED LIFE. I want to live by faith, not merely by sight. But faith comes by hearing and so we require EARS tuned to GOD'S VOICE and hearts and minds open to the promptings of the Holy Sprit. Are we listening? Are we interested in learning how to listen? God guides our lives for a distinct purpose: not to get us to PEFORM RIGHT ACTIONS, but to help us BECOME THE RIGHT KIND OF PERSON. His aim is to shape/mold us until, little by little, we start to resemble Jesus. The GUIDED LIFE isn't a spiritual HIT-AND-RUN: where we get what we need from God and leave. Guidance only makes sense in the context of a committed life. We seek first God's kingdom first; we are obedient to his word; we are open and ready to respond to his call. Don't seek God if all you want is INFOR-MATION, or to use God to make your life easier. You may desire God to change your circumstances; God desires to change you. You may ask God to solve your problems; God desires to use you as part of the solution to the problem. The life God intends for you is a GUIDED LIFE, a life open to the leading of the Holy Spirit. As you may know, the word "disciple" means "one who is willing to be led." Are we ready and willing to be led by God? It will take more than our words to prove it.

Second Harvest Food Bank of Northeast Tennessee collects and distributes food throughout our community using a variety of programs and services. First Presbyterian Church provides "last mile" delivery service each month during the school year from the Church parking lot to nine Kingsport Elementary Schools that participate in Food for Kids Backpack Program®. Also through the Outreach Committee, FPC provides financial support directly to Second Harvest Food Bank. This is a particularly hard time for Second Harvest to meet increased demand brought about in part by increasing inflation. ## Q & A's Related to Ukrainian Refugee Family

Where did Oksana, Max and Alisa live in Ukraine? They lived on the 10<sup>th</sup> floor of a high rise residential building in Sumy, Ukraine about 30 miles from the Russian border.

How did they get from Sumy, Ukraine to Mount Carmel, Tennessee? Soon after the Russian Army began bombing Sumy, their home was damaged by those attacks. Oksana knew she and her children needed to go to a safer place. She took a minivan ride to a location closer to the Romanian border. After three days of travel with only one backpack of clothes and personal items each, they made it to a shelter further away from Russia that was not under attack. With much help from her dear friend Yulia Wright here in Mt Carmel, they flew from Europe to Tijuana, Mexi-



co. Yulia took money from her savings to purchase airline tickets for them. A trip that took four days without being able to speak local languages. From Tijuana, they walked to the US border. They were assisted at the border by volunteers from a Russian church in Sacramento who were arranging transportation, food and overnight accommodations for Ukrainian refugees. There were also Russian speaking attorney's there counseling refugees and helping with their immigration process. The next two months were spent in California with Yulia's sister, then on May 29 they arrived at Tri-Cities Airport to begin their new life in East Tennessee!

<u>Did they have to leave a husband/father behind to help defend their country?</u> No, Oksana is widowed unrelated to the war. What a strong women to undertake such a mission on blind faith to safety!

What do they think about this area so far? Upon arrival, they were instantly impressed with how much cooler and greener it is than where they were in California. They are surprised and most grateful for the kindness and generosity of people here. Oksana thinks it is unbelievable that so many people could be so helpful to complete strangers! Oksana sends a sincere thank you for all of the prayers and nice things that people have done to help them feel important again.



What have they done since arriving here? Their first family outing was an enjoyable outdoor visit to Bays Mountain Park to see all the animals and natural beauty there. Yulia's son built a computer for Max to continue his Ukrainian on-line studies and of course play some computer games! He also joined a local gym to help "stay healthy," and he assembled a rocking chair for his little sister. Alisa has spent a lot of time playing with her baby dolls and "reading" books! Oksana is reportedly working on getting her nail station set up at home, and enjoying lots of family time!
