What's in a Name

Our names give more than our identity. They tell a story. They have meaning. They influence how we see ourselves and how others think of us. In biblical times, names were symbolic. They often connected a person to their family story. Isaiah, writing 700 years before Jesus, describes the Messiah not by **a name**, but **by titles**:

Wonderful Counselor, Everlasting Father, Mighty God, Prince of Peace

In ways that Isaiah couldn't imagine, we see Jesus in every line. Even now, nearly 2,800 years after he wrote, they still describe him. Unlike Isaiah, who describes the Messiah in lofty titles, Matthew grounds him in history. He retraces Jesus' family tree, recording 42 generations of his genealogy. Forget ancestry.com! Israel used genealogies to clarify legal rights and to assess financial status. Theirs was an oral culture; they kept few written records. Back then, people talked. Do you recall when people talked? Families could recite generations of their family tree from memory. Matthew focuses on his given name: JESUS, a name so common that one out of every 5 Hebrew boys would bear it. His having a list wasn't as shocking as the names he includes in it. He adds 3 FOREIGN WOMEN-outsiders named Ruth/Rahab/Tamar-into the list. He drops the name of Uriah, whom David killed to conceal his adultery with Bathsheba. He starts Jesus' story with pagans and flawed leaders. Matthew isn't name dropping or telling spicy tales to make his story popular. He was making a larger point about this birth. The Kingdom Jesus revealed wouldn't be the Kingdom of their dreams. He put his readers on notice: get ready for one surprise after another. He wasn't telling a story that they wanted to hear but that they **needed to hear.** God is no respecter of **human plans**. He works in mysterious ways. God does the INCREDIBLE, not the PREDICTABLE. However common his name was, it still gives Jesus' mission away, "HE WHO SAVES."

Matthew is tipping us off: his **list resembles** the **cast of characters** that Jesus would later draw into his life. **Jesus' birth** wouldn't **be respectable**; his life **sent shockwaves** through the world. Every time you sign your name, remember that they tell a story. Not just our family story, but God's story. We may carry **scars from our past**, but we are **works in progress**. We aren't **FLAWED PEOPLE** just because **our parents had flaws**. His genealogy is meant to inspire us to **have hearts for people** far from God. God sent Jesus into a hurting world that he might turn people who were **ACCIDENTS WAITING TO HAPPEN** into people **WHO MAKE THINGS HAPPEN**.

Family Promise Church Rotation Resumes

COVID-19 presented an enormous challenge to the Family Promise ministry. Prior to the pandemic, an important part of providing temporary shelter and nurture for homeless families with children was accomplished through "church rotation." That is, arrangements were made for homeless families to spend the night, one week at a time, at different churches in and near Kingsport. Drastic changes had to be made when churches stopped holding in-person services and placed restrictions on access to prevent the spread of the Coronavirus. Shelter and meals for homeless families in the program continued, but instead of church Sunday School rooms the families have had to stay in motel rooms. As of the beginning of October, the "church rotation" system has returned and our turn is coming soon. Mark your calendar. First Presbyterian Church is scheduled to host families enrolled in Family Promise from the evening of **December 11 until the morning of December 18.** As always, we will be partnering with Saint Dominic Catholic Church. You can help by providing a meal or by volunteering as an evening or overnight host to stay a few hours with the participants in our church.
