



Family Promise

Family Promise of Greater Kingsport provides care to homeless families with minor children. Many families have benefited from shelter, food, counseling and other means of assistance made available through this nonprofit organization during the past 20 years. Prior to the pandemic, churches throughout Kingsport would house and provide meals for one, two, or three families of various sizes in their buildings, usually in Sunday school classrooms, for two to four weeks each year. Cots were supplied by the program.

The pandemic changed many things. Fewer churches are willing to host families, and churches that still participate have fewer volunteers to stay with the families. To deal with these issues, Family Promise of Greater Kingsport has obtained a house and two small apartments for sheltering families. Whether or not families will be housed in church buildings in the future is uncertain. There are currently two families in the program. One family consists of a mother and one child, and the other is a mother and four children. Supper was provided to these families by members of First Presbyterian Church and our partner, St. Dominic Catholic Church, the week of December 10 through December 16.
