

This walk to the cemetery was one eerie walk. They didn't talk much. Dread filled the air. It was like walking on eggshells. They'd come to anoint his dead body with spices, but they had to remove a huge stone blocking his gravesite. We push against stones all our lives. The employer who is hard to please, a crisis that won't go away, a marriage that seems destined for the ditch. We push against disease, despair, depression, or whatever obstacle stands between us and our dreams. Didn't Jesus tells us, "those who try to save their lives will lose them" but we don't listen. Every good thing in life comes to an end. We will lose all that we have tried to save. Can we do anything to resist the limits life imposes on us? Is the grave our destiny? What if death is not the end? What if God's resounding answer is not a "NO" but a "YES". By the time they arrived at his tomb, it was all over. Oddly, though, the stone has already been removed. They walk inside only to see an angel in white who says, DON'T BE AFRAID.

It is the first word out of every Angel's mouth in the bible. What is a person supposed to say standing near an empty grave? The angel wasn't nearly as alarming as the message itself. They'd come looking for Jesus, the man they loved, their crucified leader, and yet he wasn't there. His tomb was empty. They ran out as fast as their feet would take them. Fear seized them. It is a fitting response to any experience of God. Let your first thought of Easter be three grown women, with their dresses hiked up to their knees, screaming as they leave a graveyard. Let their screams be heard around the world: believe in the impossible.



Love's Longest Walk

Most people try to keep a distance between themselves and death. They try to stay healthy, to work out, and to watch what they eat. No matter how careful they are, death finally strikes someone they love. One day a Minister began his sermon with a startling word, "EVERYONE IN THIS CHURCH IS GOING TO DIE." Heads turned. People shuffled in their seats. A man near the front just sat there smiling. The Pastor glared at him and asked him why he was smiling. He replied, "I DO NOT BELONG TO THIS CHURCH. I'M VISITING MY SISTER." It isn't a laughing matter. There is a rhythm built into the universe: SEASONS CHANGE, death follows life, and there is no denial of the facts: we all get hit by grief. Ask the women who came to Jesus' tomb. HE WAS DEAD. Their grief was overwhelming. They'd been with him since Galilee. Ah, Galilee! What a happier time and a more joyful place than this cemetery. Jesus was so full of life, restoring and healing lives. Before Mary Magdalene met him, her soul was torn apart by seven demons. He was her Savior! Literally!

The History of Our Church

Over the next several months the History Committee is sharing a bit of information about various furnishings and features of our church. You probably walk by or see them often; but don't know how they came to be a part of FPC. In the earlier days of FPC, families made memorial contributions to provide things we needed. We no longer encourage donations of things to the church, but do encourage donations to the Memorial Fund or the Legacy Program when you want to remember someone or provide funds for future church needs. These funds enable the church to direct resources where they are most needed.

Our Steeple Bell was installed in 1948 given by Dr. and Mrs. E.W. Tipton in memory of George Thomas Tipton, killed in WW2. Climbing into the first level of the steeple to see the bell and view Kingsport was a tradi-



tion of communicant classes until it became too dangerous.
