The Word and the Living Word

The Bible not only tells a story; it has a story. It didn't drop out of the sky, signed by God, written in English. It was first "oral". Jews told old stories in their native tongues. Over time they compiled them in written form: the **Old** Testament in Hebrew, the New Testament in Greek. It isn't one book but 66 books, consisting of different types of writings. They range from war stories, love stories, poems, maxims, laws, epistles, and apocalyptic writings. God tells one rollicking good story. Composed over time, it was collected first by the Jewish community, then later by Early Christians. The Old Testament unfolds with a long history of heroes/heroines; a set of poems/songs Jews used in worship known as the Psalms. We get the masterpiece on human suffering, Job, proverbs, the musings of major/minor Prophets. We dive into New Testament where we find four Gospels-all unique accounts of Jesus' life-not to mention the other Gospels that didn't make the cut. We move to Luke's account of the Early Church in Acts, then Paul's letters, the writings of other apostles, a Christian sermon called Hebrews, and end with John's apocalypse. The Church debated which books to include/exclude. Different communities collected writings that they viewed as "authentic". One church might have the Gospel of Mark, a letter from Paul; another might have Luke and James. God's hand was involved but so were many human hands and minds. By the 4th century, they sorted out what was ORTHO-DOX from what was BORDERLINE; they formed a CANON, the official list of what they deemed as God's word. It is wise to recall: we don't worship the bible; we worship Christ through it. The bible is God's written word, pointing to Jesus, God's living word. Jesus was the MAIN STORY GOD WANT-ED TO TELL. Many people treat it like a GOOD LUCK CHARM, a good **OLD BOOK** they **use** in tough times.

I feel like I drift in a fog of confusion when I open the bible.

We've all been in that "fog on confusion", lost in odd phrases weird names, bizarre stories. We read pages but we don't know what we just read. Don't give up. We revere scripture as God's word, but it has odd parts that require interpretation. We don't have to check our minds at the door as we read it. To study it well, we must devote time. Something crucial starts to occur: we change and our spiritual IQ grows. We become well-grounded in faith. We become more like Jesus. If we neglect the bible, then the price we pay is lethargy. The choice is ours.
