

From the Cutting Room Floor

This summer I am preaching from Acts but there are good stories I had to leave on the cutting room floor. Today, I offer you one of the most bizarre. Let me set the stage with a question.

Would you like people to know your name, ask for your autograph, or scream in joy whenever they see you?

Neither would I! Neither would Paul! He/Barnabas were acclaimed as gods by a crowd for healing a man in Lystra. Yes, a healing brought them negative publicity. The town assumed that Paul must be the cure. They worked themselves into a frenzy. They thought of ways to welcome Gods in their midst. Outside the city, there was a **PAGAN TEMPLE**. Legend had it that when Zeus/Hermes first came to the area, people gave them an inhospitable reception, only one couple welcomed them. Gods flooded the town, destroyed everything but this couple. This time, the town spared no expense. Oxen were sacrificed. Garlands of flowers were draped on Paul/Barnabas and spread in their honor. It was time to party! At first, the two men stayed silent until it hit them: people had seen the sign, but not heard the Gospel. They became so obsessed by the **POWER OF THE APOSTLES** that they didn't listen to the WORD OF THE APOSTLES. Shocked, the Apostles tore their garments-a Hebrew form of protest-expressing their anger at the idolatry. They were no less mortal than the people. Paul tells them that he has the same human limitations as they do. The more he talked, the more they thought he was the God Hermes.

Many Gentiles were "God-fearers" but the majority worshiped pagan gods. Their worldview is called "syncretism" - in case you need a new word this summer-the view of having more than one God. Israel was tempted by idols and the pagan God of neighbors. They didn't listen to Paul; they wanted God on their terms. They wanted to throw a GOD PARTY for their **GUESTS OF HONOR** but who wants **a God** who won't accept their throne. The Lystra crowd became a mob. They spared Barnabas but stoned the "God poser", and left Paul on a garbage heap outside of town thinking he was dead. Idolatry, in whatever form it takes, is always adoration at a distance. It is the ultimate form of manipulation: we get what we want but avoid the changes God wants to make. Some people still whittle God down to **THEIR SIZE**. They deal with God to keep him from dealing with them. There is no better way to **DOMESTICATE GOD** than to reduce God down to level of our convictions: where the main role God plays is to confirm what we already think, making us feel better about who we are. Just some food for your thoughts!



Commissioned Lay Pastor

What do Cheryl Rice, Tom Wilson, Martin Christian, Dan Moore, and John Baber have in common? All are current or past members of FPC. They are also Commissioned Lay Pastors with Martin Christian going the next step into seminary and becoming an ordained teaching elder.

What is a Commissioned Lay Pastor? CLPs are trained ruling elders who are authorized only within the bounds of the presbytery which trained them and sometimes for a single congregation. They may preach, moderate Session meetings, and lead worship including the sacraments. CLPs date to 1984 when a need had arisen for pastoral leadership in geographically remote areas. The General Assembly created a lay role to fulfill this need. The role is vital today as many smaller congregations are unable to support full time clergy.

Our centennial history disclosed that this church under the leadership of Dr. M. O. Sommers created pulpit supply teams, a precursor to CLPs, to lead worship in our chapels and other local churches in the 1950s. Dr. Sommers, Rev. T. W. Buchanan, and Rev. John R. MacKinnon held training sessions in November 1950.
