(4) The Kitchen at Grace Meadows



Anxious for Everything

If we don't manage stress, it will manage us. People seem so edgy. We are downright uptight people. Life is hectic; stress nips at us; our anxiety level is through the roof. Anxiety is like "worry on steroids", a floating sense of doom, dwelling on worst-case scenarios that may play out. We live on edge; we wait for the other shoe to drop. Fearing what may happen may be worse than what does happen. Do we have control in choosing how we react? Does it depend on how stressful a situation is, how long it lasts, or who is involved? Assess your own life:

What keeps you awake at night? What distracts you? What do you dread? What makes your pulse race, your chest tighten?

One minute we are fine until a crisis **blindsides us.** We start **anticipating the next one.** We can't **relax**. All peace is **short term**. Misfortune/doom lurk everywhere. Stress turns worry warts into **PANIC VICTIMS**. A **nagging headache** may be a **brain tumor**; the **latest Middle East** crisis could trigger World War III. Listen to Paul's words:

Have no anxiety about anything but in prayer let your requests be made known to God.

In what world did he live? Having LESS ANXIETY, finding better WAYS TO COPE, seems more doable. He says "have no anxiety", not "worry less." That is like telling a person with the flu not to sneeze, or a gambler to avoid the track. Is anxiety a disease, an addiction, or both? If we can't LIVE WITHOUT ANXIETY, can we at least LIVE BEYOND IT? Paul lived on DEATH ROW - a perfect setting for anxiety - yet he didn't dwell on what had gone wrong, what he'd lost, but on his faith.

With every reason to gripe/get depressed, he says, "in gratitude let your requests be known to God." With every reason to give up, he says, "I can do all things through him who gives me strength." Attitudes are more important than FACTS. How we act/react can be more harmful than the threat itself. Do we focus on problems, how they limit us or on the other side of a problem and how GOD HELPS US? Anxiety isn't a sin. It is an EMOTION. Left unchecked, it can lead to sin. Christianity is meant to be a life of peace, but we are no less anxious than others. Jesus said, "can you add one hour to your life by worry?" Jesus managed his stress. He stayed calm, not because he was DIVINE but because he was spiritually focused. He went from one crisis to the next. He didn't reduce stress by reducing his schedule. He drew near to God, released his burden, renewed his strength, and learned how to be a NON-ANXIOUS presence no matter where he was. How can we stay calm, be less anxious? Release your burdens. Let go and let God!
